

# ROTARY'S ROLE IN \$9m+ FIGHT FOR OUR FARMERS

Channel Nine has joined forces with Australian Rotarians and the National Farmers' Federation to raise funds for Aussie farmers facing the worst drought in living memory. At the time of print, more than \$9 million had been raised, with the figure still rising. The funds will be distributed to farmers in need by Australian Rotary clubs and districts, in conjunction with the National Farmers' Federation.

**ACROSS** the country, thousands of farmers and their families are battling the country's worst drought in 100 years. One hundred percent of NSW and around two-thirds of Queensland is now in drought, with pastures turned to rubble and the cost of freight and feed skyrocketing. Many Australians have been forced to make gut-wrenching decisions in order to survive.

As part of the *Today* show's Fighting for our Farmers drought relief appeal, Channel Nine partnered with Rotary in Australia, the National Farmers' Federation (NFF), Optus and Westpac to host Nine's Farm Aid Telethon on August 20. More than \$9 million was

raised for farmers doing it tough as a result of the devastating natural disaster that has ravaged much of rural Australia.

Broadcasting live from the Dubbo Showground in Central West NSW and Warwick in Southeast Queensland, the event saw residents enjoy a jumping castle, mechanical bull and live performances from Shannon Noll, Mental As Anything, Dragon and Wendy Matthews.

# HANDS-ON HELP IN DISTRICT 9650

To protect the identity of the people involved, I will not mention their names or the name of the town.

On Wednesday, August 15, I received a phone call from a lady "out west" who was very distressed and nervous. From my time at Lifeline as a suicide counsellor, I believe she was probably suicidal and if not suicidal, she was in a very bad way.

She very timidly asked if we, Rotary, could give her one bale of hay. She told me her husband asked her not to ring us, but she felt she had no other choice. I assured her we could, and would, help her. I decided to make a "Captain's call".

I purchased the last two bales of hay in town, then rang a fellow Rotarian and asked if he could deliver them for me. This required a round trip of around seven hours. It was no problem my friend said. Without a second thought, he donated a large round bale of hay, some cattle pellets and a few other things then set out.

As he was nearing the town, he phoned the lady, said he was nearly there and asked her to put the kettle on for a cup of coffee. The woman replied, "If you want coffee, you'd better bring some. We haven't had any for three weeks."

After delivering the hay and other supplies, my friend took the lady shopping to purchase everyday goods they could not afford.

My friend rang me later to say that the woman and her husband were absolutely thrilled, yet still embarrassed. In a matter of two days they had gone from abject depression, to ecstatic joy, and all because of a few bales of hay, some groceries and the realisation that others really care.

I am so very proud of my club members, my RAWCS team and the fact that I am a Rotarian.

Billie and Fox are 10 and 8-year-old kids wanting to help make a difference to our farmers. They have donated out of their own money and would like to ask other kids to do the same. It's not just the farmers that need help, it's the kids of farmers as well.
