- Over 210,000 people;

- Our volunteer Response Team Members have given an incredible 1120 days of their time, energy and skill, leaving their own families to help provide emergency shelter and vital support to families around the world who have lost so much.

NEW THEME ANNOUNCED **ROTARY CONNECTS THE WORLD**

President elect Mark Daniel Maloney announced the 2019-20 theme – *Rotary Connects the World* – to incoming district governors at the International Assembly in San Diego, US, on Monday, January 14.

During his address, Mark explained his vision for building a stronger Rotary, calling on leaders to expand connections to their communities and to embrace innovative membership models.

"Rotary allows us to connect with each other, in deep and meaningful ways, across our differences," he said. "It connects us to people we would never otherwise have met, who are more like us than we ever could have known. It connects us to our communities, to professional opportunities, and to the people who need our help. Through Rotary, we connect to the incredible diversity of humanity on a truly unique footing, forging deep and lasting ties in pursuit of a common goal. In this ever-more divided world, Rotary connects us all."

Mark also addressed some of the issues clubs need to tackle head-on to ensure Rotary has a future.

He said we all need to look at new ways of adapting to ensure Rotary remains strong in its ability to serve the global community. Widespread culture change is necessary to ensure younger people, who have busy family and professional lives, can

become Rotarians and Rotary leaders.

"We need to foster a culture where Rotary does not compete with the family, but rather complements it," Mark said. "That means taking real, practical steps to change the existing culture: being realistic in our expectations, considerate in our scheduling, and welcoming of children at Rotary events on every level."

He believes Rotary must adapt to suit the lives of young professionals with decades of services to give, not close ourselves off with unnecessary expectations that mean only retirees can cope with time demands.

"The first emphasis is to grow Rotary — to grow our service, to grow the impact of our projects, but, most importantly, to grow our membership so that we can achieve more."

Mark also wishes to focus on Rotary's relationship with the United Nations during his term, with who we have worked for decades to address humanitarian issues around the world.

"Rotary shares the United Nations' enduring commitment to a healthier, more peaceful, and more sustainable world," Mark said. "And Rotary offers something no other organisation can match: an existing infrastructure that allows people from all over the world to connect in a spirit of service and peace and take meaningful action toward that goal."
